Fleas

Fleas are the most common feline parasites in the UK and Ireland, with one study showing that 1 in 4 cats have fleas! Unfortunately, because of central heating, fleas are now a year-round problem and 95% of a flea infestation will remain hidden in your home. Flea bites can be very uncomfortable and itchy and some cats can develop an allergic reaction to flea saliva.



Ticks

Ticks spend most of their lives in the environment and although they are more active in spring and autumn, increasing temperatures mean they are now considered a year-round problem. These unpleasant parasites bite and feed on blood. They can also transmit some serious diseases to pets and humans.



Ear mites

Ear mites live in the ear canal, causing discharge, inflammation, itchiness and local allergic reactions. This can be very sore for cats. Ear mites are normally spread through contact with another animal that already has mites.



Roundworms

Roundworms are the most common worms found in cats in the UK and Ireland. Eggs can be swallowed from the environment and cats that hunt can also pick them up by eating infected prey. Occasionally roundworms will be spotted in cat's faeces, with adult worms growing to around 6-10cm long! Scarily, these worms and their larvae can cause disease in animals and humans.



Tapeworms

Tapeworms can cause gastrointestinal upsets in cats and this parasite can also spread to humans. Cats that hunt are more prone to tapeworm, as this parasite is often transmitted through eating infected prey. Fleas can also transmit tapeworm larvae, meaning all cats – even those that are indoor only – are potentially at risk of catching tapeworm.

As well as these offenders, cats can also pick up rarer parasites including **lungworm** and **hookworm**.

FAQs

- When do I need to use Felpreva®?
- Always follow your vet's advice. Felpreva® is usually applied every three months to provide year-round flea and tick protection as well as quarterly treatment against worms & mites.
- How old does my cat need to be to start using Felpreva®?
- A: Kittens must be 10 weeks old and weigh at least 1kg before they are treated with Felpreva®.
- Q: I have more than one cat, can I use the same pipette size on all my cats?
- A: Your vet has prescribed the appropriate Felpreva® pipette size based on how much each cat weighs. It is important to follow this advice and use the correct size pipette and only when prescribed for each individual animal.

Felpreva for small cats	1.0-2.5kg
Felpreva for medium cats	>2.5-5kg
Felpreva for large cats	>5-8kg

- O: How do I make sure my cat doesn't lick the application site?
- A: Follow the instructions to apply the liquid at the base of the neck where your cat cannot easily reach.
- When can I expect to stop seeing fleas?
- A: Felpreva® kills fleas on your cat and will go on killing new fleas which jump on for 13 weeks. It is normal to still see occasional fleas as they will go on emerging from pupae hidden in the home, often for several weeks. Felpreva will then kill these fleas before they can lay new eggs. Your vet may also advise a household spray to help bring the infestation under control.

Always follow your vet's advice and speak to them with any questions.

Parasite control for your cat

Felpreva® is a spot-on solution in a single dose applicator. You should apply the solution directly to the skin at the back of your cat's neck, following the instructions in the package insert leaflet.

Once absorbed, it protects your cat wherever they are attacked by external parasites, such as fleas and ticks, and also treats the undesired worms that might be living inside your cat's body.

Protection for your family and home

Some parasites can spread from cats to humans; keeping up to date with parasite treatments can help prevent home infestations, as well as maintaining the health and well-being of not only your cat – but also helping to protect the rest of your family.



How to apply Felpreva®

Step 1

Use scissors to open the blister pack, pull foils apart and remove spot-on applicator from package.

Step 2

Hold applicator in upright position, twist and pull off the cap and use the opposite end of the cap to break the seal.

Step 3

Part the fur on the back of your cat's neck, as close to the base of the skull as possible, until the skin is visible.

Place the tip of the applicator on the skin and squeeze firmly several times to fully empty the contents of the spot-on directly onto your cat's skin.

Application of the liquid at the base of the skull will help to stop your cat from licking the product off.
